These Holy Days are actually observed beginning at sunset on the evening before the dates listed above, and end on these dates at sunset, since days begin and end at sunset in the Bahá'í calendar. Please note that as the Bahá'í Holy Days are fixed considering characteristics of both the lunar and solar calendars, the dates provided above will vary slightly each calendar year.

It may interest you to know that the essential message of Bahá'u'lláh is that of unity. Bahá'ís can be found around the globe in nearly every country. Young and old, throughout New Zealand, are currently taking part in a process of community building based on concepts enshrined in the Bahá'í Teachings—joining with others to learn and act for the betterment of neighbourhoods and communities, and to cultivate hope for the future.
